

Place Of Hope Expands Treasure Coast Office With Addition Of Development Associate Jamie Bond

Place of Hope is excited to announce the expansion of its Treasure Coast office operations with the addition of Business Development and Community Relations Associate Jamie Bond.



Place of Hope grew into the Treasure Coast region in 2015 with the mission of recruiting more foster families

to care for the ever-present population of abused, neglected and abandoned children. After two years with the nonprofit organization, Bond transferred from the Paxson Campus of Place of Hope in Palm Beach Gardens to the Hobe Sound office to oversee its development in Martin, St. Lucie, Okeechobee and Indian River counties.

In her role, Bond will establish and increase resources and revenue streams, such as major gifts and foundation funding; grow community awareness; develop and cultivate existing donor relationships; and foster more involvement with Place of Hope's volunteer corps, called Angel Moms.

Bond will also plan and execute signature events, such as the recently held Sea of Hope Angel Moms Luncheon. The Second Annual Sea of Hope luncheon was held April 7 at the Willoughby Golf Club in Stuart. Co-chaired by Caye Johnson and Cristy Brown, the event welcomed the public to learn more about foster parenting and celebrate the gains being made in the Treasure Coast.

She will work alongside Place of Hope's licensing and recruitment specialists, who guide families through the state-mandated process to foster children.

Prior to joining Place of Hope, Bond was the general manager of a high-end steakhouse. Her professional background encompasses hospitality with a strong focus on operations and leadership. As part of the development team, she has overseen popular Place of Hope events, such as the Annual Golf Invitational and Charity Dinner; its annual Table 26 collaborative dinner; and the first #FitforHope campaign, a series of fitness-oriented events that showcased local fitness facilities and their members raising funds for foster care.

A native Floridian with family in Okeechobee and Martin counties and a resident of North Palm Beach, Bond attended Northwood University in West Palm Beach, where she earned degrees in advertising and marketing with a minor in hotel, restaurant and resort management.
