Boca Raton Garden Club prepares for season

Upon retirement, she served on the Planning & Zoning Board for 15 years. She enjoys quality time with her son, daughter and four grandchildren.

Johnson outlined the six-month plan for the 150-member club. Monthly meetings take place the first Tuesday of each month at the clubhouse,

"The third Thursday of the month is a horticulture meeting," Johnson said. "Sometimes it is a field trip. In December we went to the Breakers hotel gardens, which was fabulous. Sometimes it is a speaker or an in-house lesson on some aspect of planting.

"Each month we raise funds and have fun while doing so. This February, Sherrie Bieber is chairing a Florida Beach Party with live music and a great dinner. March will showcase our annual Treasures Sale and Plant Sale where gently used items donated by our members are sold to the public. Sheila Thomas, chairlady, will accept all usable donations."

All plants for sale are homegrown, and donated by club members and neighbors. Jo Hofmeyer and Kathy Laws are arranging an Art for Sale event in April in conjunction with Hospice by the

Sea. The season concludes with our installation luncheon at a local restaurant the first Tuesday in June, which is organized by first vice president Mary Kaub.

"We do not sit idle in the hot summer months," Johnson said. "Members meet at the clubhouse to create beautiful crafts, which are sold at our annual Holiday House Sale in November. All year long, Dirt Gardeners led by chairwoman Carol Rice toil two mornings a week to maintain our lovely gardens. We are a very busy club."

The club also raises funds toward a college scholarship for a Palm Beach County resident majoring in biology, ecol-
