Marathon efforts raise money to help South Florida charities for children

What's it like playing 150 holes of golf in one day? For Gary Collins, who played from daylight to

the end of the

day, I was still functional," said Collins, 67, whose 150 holes bested his previous mark of 146 in the Florida Seminole Region's Club Managers Association of America Marathon Golf. which benefits nine South Florida children's charities. including Place of Hope. The First Tee of the Palm Beaches, Florence Fuller Child Development Centers, 4ForKids, SOS Children's Villages and Special Olympics Florida - Palm Beach County.

This year's sixth annual Marathon Golf, which concludes with marathons Monday at Wycliffe and Addison Reserve and Tuesday at Hunters Run, had 17 teams playing at 10 clubs, including Mirasol, Harbour Ridge, Loxahatchee, Jupiter, Gleneagles, Fountains and Coral Ridge.

Collins, a former club manager who is now a partner at Master Club Advisors, which places golf pros, superintendents and chefs at golf clubs, said participants get people to pledge either a flat amount or an amount per hole.

Based on the pledges received so far, Collins said this year's event will surpass last year's \$155,000 and might exceed \$200,000.

"It makes such a huge difference in these kids' lives," said Collins, who emphasized that "every dime of the money we raise goes to the charities. ..."



The flat design helps golfers square the putter's face no matter their putting style, which translates into a better, more accurate roll. Endorsed by instructor Hank Haney. the Flat Cat is available in Slim, Standard, Fat and Big

Boy sizes for \$27.99 at flatcatgolf.com.

ECCO spikeless hybrid golf shoes are known for their fit, comfort and traction. The new ECCO Mens Cage brings the same attributes to a soft-spike shoe. The shoe has a lightweight heel cage for exceptional stability, water repellent leather uppers and a sole designed to match the shape of the foot. The Cage sells for \$200 or less at golf, sporting goods and department stores, as well as online at us.shop.ecco.com.

The Nexus Laser Rangefinder gives golfers the exact distance to the pin or a hazard for less than \$200. which is significantly cheaper than other rangefinders, yet with the same or better features. Ouick. easy and comfortable to use, you can lock in on the flag and get distances to a 10th of a yard with 1-yard accuracy out to 400 yards.
